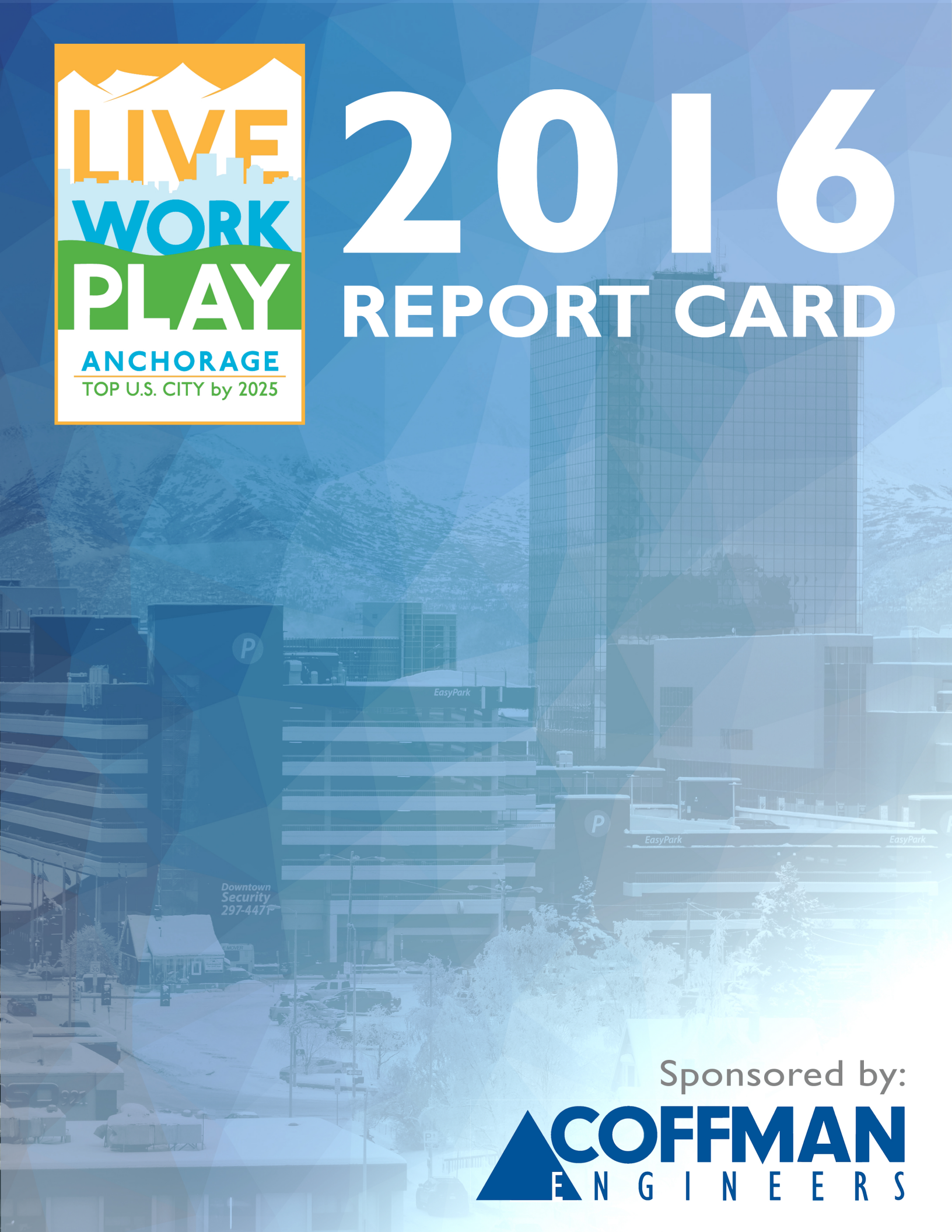

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27th LIVE

Anchorage ranks 27th. This is an increase of 10 places from last year due to lower cost of living on some housing and other essentials, increase in health care coverage and the share of homes affordable for those making a median income. This is counterbalanced by poorer rankings on property and violent crime, which are trending upward.

The Live.Work. Play. Community Safety Area of Focus is dedicated to identifying causes of public safety concerns in the community and addressing them through education and collective action. Anchorage Cares is an educational campaign to discourage residents from giving money directly to panhandlers, which can lead to increased traffic collisions and property crime. This

group instead encourages residents to donate directly to local homeless agencies. Through signage, media interviews, and a new website (www.anchoragecares.org), Anchorage Cares has helped shine a spotlight on the behavioral changes required to reduce panhandling and help those in need get the support that will make real change in their lives.

Anchorage ranks 17th. This is down 15 places from last year. Average wages and income have dropped some, while unemployment as well as mean commute times have increased. In late 2016, the metric “gender pay equity,” was added.

In 2016, Live.Work.Play’s Workplace Well-Being Area of Focus launched its inaugural employer survey of wellness programs. The mission of WWB is to measure current workplace practices and encourage improvement of healthy cultures and wellness programs throughout the Anchorage business community. Nine businesses that took the survey received the “Workplace Well-Being Employer Recognition Award” for raising the bar in employee health and wellness. These companies promote workplace cultures that focus on the physical, mental and emotional well-being of all their employees.

In partnership with the Anchorage Park Foundation and members of the trail-using community, the Live. Work. Play. Trails Initiative generated a proposed new wayfinding and signage plan to install throughout the Anchorage trails system in 2017. A public process that generated hundreds of comments helped to create a design for new signs and maps, made with durable, sustainable, graffiti-resistant materials. Eighty new installations will go up on the trails throughout 2017 and 2018.
