MONTHLY SUMMARY

The monthly summary, as well as industry gains and losses, are based on comparisons between the same month in 2018 and 2019. Month-on-month (e.g. July 2019 to August 2019) comparisons tend to show consistent seasonal trends, while comparing years show longer-term impacts of policy and macroeconomic change.

July 2020 experienced a drop of 15,600 jobs compared to July 2019. All sectors lost jobs substantial numbers of jobs with Leisure & Hospitality being the sector with the highest job losses at 5,800. There were no other industry sectors that did not lose a significant number of jobs in July 2020. The number of single-family homes sold year-to-date has increased significantly. The average sale price has risen to new record highs. Singlefamily home listings decreased suggesting that the housing market is a seller's market. The top employers are Providence Health and Services, and the Anchorage School District, even though there are a high number of job losses in those industry sectors. Unemployment is at 10.8% in July 2020, down from 12.0% in June 2020. This month's data reflect the continuing impacts of COVID-19 related shutdown of the Anchorage economy. Revised jobs data for the first guarter of 2020 has just been released and show that the period of January through March saw an average 800 jobs lost in the quarter. This reflects a continuation of the 5-year recession into 2020 prior to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic impacts that now grip the city's economy.




ANCHORAGE EMPLOYMENT

Total Anchorage employment was at 138,400 in July 2020, showing a decrease of about 15,600 jobs compared to July 2019.



GOODS PRODUCING JOBS


Anchorage's goods producing sector lost 1,600 jobs or 11% in July 2020 compared with July 2019.












CONSTRUCTION EMPLOYMENT

At 8,300 jobs, Anchorage construction employment shed 600 jobs between July 2019 and July 2020. This is down from modest increases construction jobs in 2018 and 2019.



OIL & GAS EMPLOYMENT

Anchorage's oil and gas sector shed 600 jobs between July 2019 and July 2020. This is a 24% decline.









SERVICES PROVIDING JOBS

Services providing industries shed approximately 14,000 jobs between July 2019 and July 2020. These significant job losses are a result of complications and challenges due to COVID-19.




Anchorage's professional & business services sector saw a decrease of 1,200 jobs between July 2019 and July 2020.








ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME LISTINGS

ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME MONTHLY UNIT SALES


YTD 10-YEAR COMPARISON

Anchorage's single-family home monthly unit sales stood at 388 in June 2020, which is up 78 from July 2019 at 310 sales.










ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME AVERAGE SALES PRICE

The average price of a single-family home in Anchorage dropped to \$350,926 in November 2019 from \$365,041 in November 2018.

The number of single-family home unit sales year-to-date increased in July 2020 to 1,586, up 211 units sold compared to the period in 2019, showing a significant increase in home sales.

TAKEAWAY


Anchorage's unemployment rate in July was 10.8%, down 1.2% compared to June 2020. To date there are 15,750 unemployed individuals compared to 7,131 in July of 2019. Anchorage's labor force stands at 146,014 (employment + unemployment = labor force). Statewide, the Alaska Department of Labor noted over 38,096 unemployed individuals for the month of July 2020 compared to 19,960 in July 2019.

Anchorage continues to show the lowest unemployment numbers in the southcentral region with the Kenai Peninsula Borough coming in at 11.9% unemployment, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough at 11.8% unemployment and the State of Alaska as a whole at 10.8% unemployment for the beginning of July 2020.


January 2013 to July 2020

Wage and Salary Employment


Percent change from same month the previous year
