

MONTHLY SUMMARY

The monthly summary, as well as industry gains and losses, are based on comparisons between the same month in 2019 and 2020. Month-onmonth (e.g., July 2020 to August 2020) comparisons tend to show consistent seasonal trends, while comparing years show longer-term impacts of policy and macroeconomic change.

August 2020 experienced a drop of 14,200 jobs compared to August 2019. All sectors lost substantial numbers of jobs with Leisure & Hospitality being the sector with the highest job losses at 6,000. There were no other industry sectors that did not lose a significant number of jobs in August 2020. The number of single-family homes sold year-to-date has increased significantly. The average sale price has risen to new record highs. Single-family home listings decreased, suggesting that the housing market is a seller's market. The top employers are Providence Health and Services, and the University of Alaska, even though there are a high number of job losses in those industry sectors. This month's data reflect the continuing impacts of COVID-19 related shutdown of the Anchorage economy.

Revised jobs data for the first quarter of 2020 has just been released and show that the period of January through March saw an average 800 jobs lost in the quarter. This reflects a continuation of the 5-year recession into 2020 prior to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic impacts that now grips the city's economy.




ANCHORAGE EMPLOYMENT

GOODS PRODUCING JOBS


Anchorage's goods producing sector lost 1,200 jobs or 8.5% in August 2020 compared with August 2019.












CONSTRUCTION EMPLOYMENT

At 8,300 jobs, Anchorage construction employment shed 600 jobs between August 2019 and August 2020. This is down from modest increases in construction jobs in 2018 and 2019.



OIL & GAS EMPLOYMENT

Anchorage's oil and gas sector shed 700 jobs between August 2019 and August 2020. This is a 24% decline.








SERVICES PROVIDING JOBS

Services providing industries shed approximately 13,000 jobs between August 2019 and August 2020. These significant job losses are a result of complications and challenges due to COVID-19.




Anchorage's professional & business services sector saw a decrease of 1,000 jobs between August 2019 and August 2020.








ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME LISTINGS

ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME MONTHLY UNIT SALES


YTD 10-YEAR COMPARISON

Anchorage's single-family home monthly unit sales stood at 360 in August 2020, which is up 63 from August 2019 at 297 sales.










ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME AVERAGE SALES PRICE

The average price of a single-family home in Anchorage grew to \$404,919 in August 2020, up nearly \$3,800 from \$401,161 in August 2019.

The number of single-family home unit sales year-to-date increased in August 2020 to 1,948, up 176 units sold compared to the period in 2019, showing a significant increase in home sales.







TAKEAWAY

Recently released unemployment data from U.S. Labor Department has come into question regarding its accuracy. In consultation with the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development Research Division, AEDC has determined that monthly unemployment estimates we normally present in this report have been negatively impacted by consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic in ways that make this data no longer a reliable measure of unemployment. This is demonstrated in the August reported unemployment rate for Anchorage that fell from 10.8% in July to 6.6% one month later, a drop of 4.2%, which is factually impossible given current jobs data and unemployment assistance claims.

AEDC will no longer be reporting the unemployment data as we have in the past until the issues and methodology problems are solved for this data. Instead, AEDC this month and in the months ahead will report the latest monthly claims data that represents both first time unemployment claims and continued unemployment claims for residents of Anchorage. Please note, while this data is representative of citizens of Anchorage only, a very small minority of the jobs these individuals were previously employed in were located outside of the Municipality of Anchorage. The combined total will provide an accurate picture of the number of people applying for or receiving ongoing unemployment benefits in Anchorage. It should be noted this dataset does not include those who are unemployed whose benefits have either ended or been denied because of ineligibility.

In the month of August, 15,925 citizens of Anchorage either applied for the first time for unemployment benefits or continued to receive unemployment benefits. Additionally, approximately 4,600 self-employed citizens received Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits. As a result, approximately 20,500 Anchorage citizens received some form of unemployment assistance in August, equal to 14.2% of the estimated Anchorage labor force out of work for this reporting period.

Excluding workers receiving PUA (for which detailed data is not available), the industry sector most impacted by job losses in August was the Food Services sector - that includes restaurants and bars - which saw 3,024 workers out of work. Retail was in second with 2,324 out of work, and Health Care was in third, showing 1,708 no longer employed. You'll find a full representation of the industry sector impacts and the average wages earned by the workers in those industries in the charts on the next page.

Looking at the year-over-year trends in this data, it is clear that the pandemic has had profound impacts on the Anchorage workforce. Year-to-date, average unemployment claimant counts are up nearly 514% in 2020, compared to the same 8-month period in 2019. In reviewing the average earnings year-to-date data, it appears that the lower-wage service sector has taken the brunt of the impacts of COVID-19 on the economy. In 2019, average wages for workers who lost their job and were claiming unemployment benefits tracked at just over \$40,000 a year during the first 8 months. For the same period in 2020, with claimant counts six times higher than in 2019, the average wages that workers had earned before becoming unemployed were down 6.4% at just over \$37,500. It is clear that that the pandemic is having a greater negative impact on lower wage service sector workers in restaurants, retail, and health care who are losing their jobs at a much higher rate than workers in higher-paying industries such as Oil & Gas, Construction, and Professional Services.

With the end of summer now past us, no upcoming PFD season for retail and restaurants in October through December, and the many unknowns of the coming winter and further impacts on the Anchorage and Alaska economy, there is much to be concerned about regarding the future in the coming 6-8 months.
