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

MONTHLY SUMMARY

The monthly summary, as well as industry gains and losses, are generally based on comparisons between the same month in 2019 and 2020. Month-on-month (e.g. August 2020 to September 2020) comparisons tend to show consistent seasonal trends, while comparing years show longer-term impacts of policy and macroeconomic change.

October 2020 experienced a drop of 14,100 jobs compared to October 2019. All sectors lost substantial numbers of jobs with Leisure & Hospitality being the sector with the highest job losses at 4,800. There were no other industry sectors that did not lose a significant number of jobs in October 2020. The number of single-family homes sold year-to-date has increased significantly.

The average sale price has risen to new record highs. Single-family home listings decreased, suggesting that the housing market is a seller's market. The top employers are Providence Health and Services, and the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium, even though there are job losses in the Healthcare sector. Unemployment is at 10.6% in October 2020, down from 11.7% in September 2020. This month's data reflects the continuing impacts of COVID-19 related shutdown of the Anchorage economy.

Revised jobs data for the second quarter of 2020 has just been released and shows that the period from April through June saw an average 19,600 jobs lost in the quarter. This reflects the direct impact of the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic



Anchorage's job market continues to deal with unprecedented job losses as a result of the COVID-19 crisis. Every industry sector took a significant hit with particularly large impacts to Leisure & Hospitality, Transportation, Health Care, Retail, and Oil & Gas.


ANCHORAGE EMPLOYMENT

Total Anchorage employment was at 138,300 in October 2020, showing a decrease of about 14,000 jobs compared to October 2019.



GOODS PRODUCING JOBS

Anchorage's goods producing sector lost 1,100 jobs or 8.5% in October 2020 compared with October 2019.










CONSTRUCTION EMPLOYMENT

At 8,000 jobs, Anchorage construction employment shed 200 jobs between October 2019 and October 2020. This is down from modest increases construction jobs in 2018 and 2019.



OIL & GAS EMPLOYMENT

Anchorage's oil and gas sector shed 700 jobs between October 2019 and October 2020. This is a 26.9% decline.


Anchorage's professional & business services sector saw a decrease of 1,100 jobs between October 2019 and October 2020.















Anchorage Single Family Home Listings Monthly Totals 10-Year Comparison as of 10/31/2020



ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME LISTINGS

Anchorage's single-family home listings stood at 524 as of October 2020, a decrease of 338 from 862 listings in October 2019.



ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME MONTHLY UNIT SALES YTD 10-YEAR COMPARISON


Anchorage's single-family home monthly unit sales stood at 359 in October 2020, which is up 121 sales from 238 in October 2019.






ANCHORAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOME AVERAGE SALES PRICE

YTD 10-YEAR COMPARISON

The average price of a single-family home in Anchorage grew to \$406,974 in October 2020, up \$43,756 from \$363,218 in October 2019.

The number of single-family home unit sales year-to-date increased in October 2020 to 2,636, up 362 units sold compared to the period in 2019, showing a significant increase in home sales.

UNEMPLOMENT DATA

Just released unemployment data from the U.S. Labor Department remains questionable regarding its accuracy. In a statement issued with the October Jobs Data press release, the Alaska Department of Labor noted "Jobs and unemployment insurance claims are better indicators of the state's economic health than the unemployment rate, however, which has fallen in recent months because of difficulties conducting a key household survey during a pandemic and technical issues with the model the Bureau of Labor Statistics uses to calculate the rate. Job losses remain historically large and claims during the second week of October were about seven times higher than last year."

As we noted earlier this year, AEDC will no longer be reporting the unemployment data as we have in the past until the methodology problems are solved for this data. Instead, AEDC will report the latest monthly claims data that represents both first time unemployment claims, and continued unemployment claims for residents of Anchorage. Please note, while this data is representative of citizens of Anchorage only, a very small minority of the jobs these individuals were previously employed outside of the Municipality of Anchorage. The combined total will provide an accurate picture of the number of people applying for or receiving ongoing unemployment benefits in Anchorage. It should be noted this data set does not include those who are unemployed whose benefits have either ended or been denied because of ineligibility.

In the month of October, 11,671 citizens of Anchorage either applied for the first time for unemployment benefits or continued to receive unemployment benefits. Additionally, approximately 3,600 self-employed workers received special Pandemic Unemployment Assistance benefits. As a result, approximately 15,300 Anchorage citizens received some form of unemployment assistance in September, equal to 10.6% of the estimated Anchorage labor force out of work for this reporting period. As noted in previous reports, if we able were to include in this total those workers whose benefits have run out or are not qualified to receive benefits from available programs, it would likely add several thousand additional impacted workers to this figure.

Excluding workers receiving Pandemic Unemployment Assistance for which detailed data is not available, the industry sector most impacted by job losses in October was the food services sector (includes restaurants and bars) which saw 1,888 people out of work. Retail was second with 1,680 out of work, and health care was in third, showing 1,221 no longer employed. A full representation of the industry sector impacts, and the average wages earned by the workers in those industries is represented in the charts below. (See spreadsheet for charts).

Looking at the year over year trends in this data, impacts on the Anchorage workforce continue to remain at unprecedented high levels. Year to date, average unemployment claimant counts are up 509% in 2020 compared to the same 10-month period in 2019. Wage data for workers represented in this data continue to show the largest negative impacts on the lower-wage service sector which has taken the brunt of the impacts of COVID-19 on the economy. In 2019 average wages for workers who lost their job and were claiming unemployment benefits tracked at just over \$40,000 a year during the first 10 months. For the same period in 2020, with claimant counts six times higher than in 2019, the average wages that workers had earned before becoming unemployed were down 6.3% at just over \$37,550. It is likely this trend of disproportionally larger negative impacts impacts impacting lower wage service sector workers in restaurants, retail, and health care will continue into the months to come.
